

Prayer of Praise and Concern for Creation

Leader: Pope Francis has written a letter to the whole world titled *Laudato Si*, challenging all of us to join in care for the earth. Following the example of Saint Francis of Assisi, the Holy Father reminds us of the inseparable connection among concern for nature, justice for the poor, commitment to society, and interior peace. As Missionary Children, we join in prayer to thank God for the gift of His creation, and to ask for His help in guiding our choices for good.

Let us remember that we are in the holy presence of God, our Creator. We begin

Reflection:
The earth's atmosphere encompasses all people, creatures and habitats. The melting of ice sheets and glaciers, the destruction of rain forests and the pollution of water in one place can have environmental impacts elsewhere. Responses to global climate change should reflect our interdependence and responsibility for the future of our planet. Individual nations must measure their own self interest against the common good and contribute equitably to global solutions. Heat waves, droughts and storms fall most heavily on the poor who do not have the resources to either adapt or ward off the expected impact of climate change.

Go Green at Home!

- Walk or ride your bike instead of taking the car when possible
- Turn off the water when you brush your teeth

Introduce children to the World Mission Rosary. Visit www.phillymissions.org for resources, including the World Mission Rosary prayer intentions, a PowerPoint with photos from around the world, and a brief introductory video.



Assign children to research and report on a different Mission country every week. Pray for the children and families who live there.

Read with students the beautiful prayer of Saint Francis of Assisi, *Canticle of the Creatures*, with which Pope Francis begins the encyclical *Laudato Si*. Find a children’s version from Loyola Press at <http://www.loyolapress.com/canticle-of-the-sun-saint-francis-of-assisi.htm>.

- Encourage older students to reflect on the gifts of creation and write their own prayer of praise to God the Creator.
- Introduce young children to the prayer using the book *Brother Sun, Sister Moon* written by Katherine Paterson and illustrated by Pamela Dalton.

Act in solidarity

Organize a recycled toy contest. Children in the developing world make their own toys from cans, bottle caps, string, and other items our children discard. Set up a display of entries. Students can vote for their favorites with donations of coins.

Count the number of faucets in your home. Challenge your family to donate a quarter for each one to MCA to bring clean water to children in the missions.

Organize a Walk for the Missions around the parish campus or neighborhood. Children in Mission areas routinely walk miles to and from school every day.
