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

## Pray for Europe, in White, home of the Holy Father.

In Rome, Religious women like Sister Ezike attend Mater Ecclesia College. As a young girl, Sister worked with Missionary sisters to serve younger children in her village in Nigeria. Their work inspired her own vocation.



Let's pray for the Americas, represented in Red, symbolizing the Fire of Faith that brought the first Missionaries here.

**LEADER/PRESIDER:** Today we gather in prayer to thank God for the gift of Jesus and for His great love for us. Jesus wants all children to hear when He speaks to our hearts about believing in Him, loving one another and sharing our blessings. And yet, there are children today who have never heard the "Good News" of Jesus. What do you think Jesus calls you to do for them? [short pause]

Let us turn our hearts and our minds to Him in prayer and call to mind children in the Missions who suffer from poverty, neglect, violence or hunger, and ask God's special blessing upon them. May we always respond with joy to Your Good News, Lord, live by Your example, and love others as You love us. Amen



## **READING: Colossians 3:12-14**

Reader: A reading from the letter of St. Paul to the Colossians.

Brothers and sisters: Put on, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, heartfelt compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience, bearing with one another and forgiving one another, if one has a grievance against another; as the Lord has forgiven you, so must you also do. And over all these put on love, that is, the bond of perfection.

## **March Mission Saint Spotlight**

## Saint Patrick: The Apostle of Ireland

Not only in the United States, but throughout the world, Saint Patrick's Day is celebrated with parades, parties, all green decorations, and of course the popular Irish symbol, **the Shamrock**. *But did you know that Saint Patrick was a Missionary?* Even though he is one of the world's most popular saints, there is little known about the details of his life. His only two writings, the *Confessio*, a spiritual autobiography, and his *Letter to Coroticus*, a rebuke of British mistreatment of Irish Christians, tell us what we know about Saint Patrick, and how he spread Christianity throughout Ireland.

Born in Britain, he was captured by Irish pirates during a raid as a young boy. He was treated like a slave—and had to herd and tend to sheep. It was during this time that Patrick discovered his faith and turned to God for guidance. "The love of God grew in me more and more, as did the



faith, and my soul was raised, so that, in a single day, I have said as many as a hundred prayers and in the night, nearly the same. I prayed in the woods and on the mountain, even before dawn. I felt no hurt from the snow or ice or rain."

Patrick escaped after six years, but soon after, he had a vision that encouraged him to return to Ireland and help the people

there learn about God. With some reluctance, because of his lack of formal education, he entered the priesthood. Patrick, as a priest, was initially met with resistance. He persevered and saw results. Patrick, along with other Missionaries, through preaching, writing and performing and countless baptisms spread Christianity in Ireland far and wide. Saint Patrick even combined pagan rituals that were already in place in Ireland into his teachings, like the Celtic Cross, which combined the native's son worshiping with the Christian cross that is now popularly worn today.

Many legends also have been associated with his life including that he drove away all the snakes from Ireland and he introduced the Holy Trinity through the three-leaved shamrock.

Traditionally, on St. Patrick's Day, which typically occurs during Lent, families attend church in the morning and observe other rituals—including eating a traditional meal of cabbage and corned beef. The holiday has expanded into an international celebration of Irish culture and heritage.



## **Quick Facts about St. Patrick**

- There was no formal process for canonization in place when Saint Patrick died.
- He was proclaimed a Saint by popular acclaim, with the approval of a Bishop.
- The official process for canonization did not come until about the 12th century.
- Saint Patrick was the first major figure to reject slavery.
- This Saint may have brought the Latin alphabet to Ireland.
- Legend says that Saint Patrick cast out all the snakes in Ireland [see in his icon above], though many scientists say that snakes have never existed in Ireland.



## **Mission Focus: Papua New Guinea**

# Children making sacrifices to help others in need during Lent and everyday!

Pope Francis summarized what our actions should be for Lent:

"Take up the Lenten journey with enthusiasm, sustained by almsgiving, fasting and prayer. If, at times, the flame of charity seems to die in your hearts, know that it is never the case with God! He constantly gives us a chance to love anew."

Children who are Missionary Childhood Association [MCA] members know and practice this better than most people—all around the world. A perfect example is seen in Papua New Guinea [PNG], where children globally have sacrificed to help those there build a school, get medicine, etc. and the children of PNG have done the same for those even more in need!

PNG is in the eastern half of the island of New Guinea amidst islands in the Pacific ocean near Australia. About 80% of the indigent live in the rural, mountainous region, which is very difficult to reach. With few roads, most people travel by airplane or by foot. Researchers believe that it is home to the most uncontacted groups of people and undiscovered plants and species on our planet. Most of the people are Christian with about 27% Roman Catholic. Many Religious orders—Marists, Divine Word Missionaries, Capuchin Franciscans, Vincentians and Missionaries of the Sacred Heart—are still at work planting the seeds of faith among the people of this remote and beautiful country. Bringing the word of God to all remains alive and well!

Father PJ Alindogan, Director of MCA in the Diocese of Trenton, NJ took a Mission trip to the island country and visited to Diocese of Alotau-Sideia. *It took four plane rides to get to there!* He went to the Alotau-Sideia Diocese, where 60,000 Catholics are served by just 20 priests spread out over an area the size of Massachusetts. Because most supplies arrive by boat, islanders live frugally. Father PJ said of his experience, "They sleep on the floor. They don't have electricity, even the professionals walk barefoot by choice. They live in the present moment." He continued, "The basic virtue I observed was patience. They are patient with what the Lord has given them."

Father PJ met many children along the way and shared his pictures with us. Here you can see the different cultures of PNG. The children were proud to show Father how they paint their faces and dress in traditional ways.

MCA members worldwide have been hard at work helping the children of PNG—\$50,020 to-date was sent to the Alotau-Sideia Diocese to build new classrooms for students! A total of \$224,300 went to children's aid projects

across the country funding education, health programs and orphanages.

Our children helping other children a world away!

And, the children of PNG sacrificed \$14,021.50 to MCA so other children around the world may benefit from the love and care of Missionaries.
