### **Stations of the Cross**

As early as the 4th century, Christian pilgrims to the Holy Land would walk the route that Our Lord walked as He made His way to to be crucified for our Sins. When Muslims captured Jerusalem and it became

captured Jerusalem and it became too dangerous to make this pilgrimage, Christians replicated the sites back home in Europe, and developed the "Stations of the Cross" devotion. Today, all over the world, people are replicating the Stations of the Cross differently. Whichever version you use, remember the Missions in a special way with the reflections found here.

#### **REFLECTION ON THE JOURNEY**

Leader: Together we will walk along the way of the cross with Jesus. We will think about Jesus' suffering and about how that suffering ended in joy and new life at His Resurrection.

ALL: Jesus, with Your heavy wooden cross, unite our Lenten sacrifices with Your sacrifice, along the way of the cross. Be present to us about the meaning of each Station of the Cross for us and for children in the Missions.

#### **FIRST STATION**

Leader: Jesus is Condemned to Death ALL: Jesus, innocent, yet condemned to death, help children who try to hide from war each day; let them know peace through Your love. Help those of us who live in peaceful lands spread love and peace among our family, friends and neighbors.

#### **SECOND STATION**

Leader: Jesus carries His Cross
ALL: Jesus, suffering, make us aware
of the suffering in the world around
us. Help us to be generous members
of HCA so we can help heal our broken
world and turn suffering to joy.

#### **THIRD STATION**

Leader: Jesus Falls the First Time ALL: Jesus, we are stronger and have fewer burdens than many children in the world. With Your guidance, we can help to lift those who suffer by sharing our love with them.

#### **FOURTH STATION**

Leader: Jesus Meets His Mother ALL: Jesus, son of God, we thank you for sharing your mother with us. Help us to follow her example of love and faithfulness.

#### **FIFTH STATION**

**Leader:** Simon helps Jesus Carry His Cross

ALL: Jesus, weakened under the heavy cross, teach us to be grateful when friends help us, and open our hearts to make us generous and helpful to others in need like so many children in the Missions.

#### **SIXTH STATION**

**Leader:** Veronica Wipes the Face of Jesus

**ALL:** Jesus, gentle and kind, help us to be like Veronica. Show us the way to bring comfort and joy to children who do not know Your love and kindness.

SEVENTH STATION Leader:

Jesus Falls the Second Time

**ALL:** Jesus, our loving

brother, help us to be generous in out MCA Lenten sacrifices so that we may help Missionaries teach children about Your love.

#### **EIGHTH STATION**

**Leader:** Jesus Meets the Women of Jerusalem

ALL: Jesus, who loves all children, help us to show the mothers of suffering children that there is hope. Through our sharing and caring as MCA members, help us give all children a future with You.

#### **NINTH STATION**

Leader: Jesus Falls the Third Time ALL: Loving Jesus, when we fail or get hurt, help us to remember Your pain and the pain of children in the Missions who are poor, hungry and hurt. May our love for all children help heal this suffering world.



#### **TENTH STATION**

**Leader:** Jesus is Stripped of His Garments

ALL: Jesus, who sacrificed all for us, help us not to want more than we need. Open our eyes so that we appreciate what we have, and help us to share with others who do not have shelter, clothing or food.

#### **ELEVENTH STATION**

Leader: Jesus is Nailed to the Cross ALL: Jesus, when we join in the celebration of Mass, we will remember those who are not free. We are happy to be free and we pray that all children will know freedom some day.

#### **TWELTH STATION**

Leader: Jesus Dies on the Cross ALL: Jesus, crucified for us, help us to be obedient to our loving Father in heaven.

#### THIRTEENTH STATION

**Leader:** Jesus is Taken Down From the Cross

**ALL:** In the name of the Father, who sent Jesus to us; and of the Son, who died for us; and of the Holy Spirit, who fills us with love. Let us thank God for the love He has given us to share.

#### **FOURTEENTH STATION**

Leader: Jesus is Placed in the Tomb.

ALL: Jesus, silent and hidden in the tomb, we want to help children who suffer silently. Please make us generous during Lent so suffering children will know we hear their cries.

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## **March Mission Saint Spotlight**

# St. Peter Chanel: Missionary Saint and Martyr

St. Peter Chanel was born in 1803 in the diocese of Belley, France. His intelligence and simple piety brought him to the attention of the local priest, Father Trompier, who saw to his elementary education. Entering the Diocesan Seminary, Peter won the affection and the esteem of both students and professors. After his ordination he found himself in a rundown country parish and completely revitalized it in the three year span that he remained there. However, his mind was set on Missionary Work; so, in 1831, he joined the newly formed Society of Mary [Marists] which concentrated on Missionary work at home and abroad. To his dismay, he was appointed to teach at the seminary at Belley and remained

there for the next five years, diligently performing his duties.

In 1836, the Marists were given the New Hebrides in the Pacific as a field for evangelization, and the jubilant St. Peter was appointed Superior of a little band of Missionaries sent to proclaim the Faith to its inhabitants. On reaching their destination after a long tenmonth journey, the band split up and St. Peter went to the Island of Futuna accompanied by an English lay person, Thomas Boog. They were at first well received by the pagans and their king Niuliki.

However, the King's jealousy and fear were aroused when the Missionaries learned the language and gained the people's confidence. The King realized that adoption of the Christian faith would lead to the end of his privileges as High Priest and Ruler. Finally, when his own son expressed a desire to be baptized, the King's hatred erupted and he dispatched a group of his warriors to set upon the Saintly head of the Missionaries.

On April 28, 1841, three years after his arrival, St. Peter was seized and clubbed to death by those he had come to save. With his death, all his work came to fruition - within five months the entire island was converted to Christianity. St. Peter was canonized by Pope Pius XII in 1954. Peter Chanel is the first Missionary, Martyr and Patron of the Isles of Oceania.

# Mission Focus: Thika, Kenya

A small village in Kenya, called Thika, is part of a large coffee plantation. Most of the adults in the village work on the plantation, The work is hard and wages low, only around \$1.18 per day. Workers live in small tin huts on plantation land and must pay rent to the landowner. They own no land of their own to grow food. This desperate situation means that most families cannot afford essential items and often go hungry. As a result, many children are taken out of school to help their parents earn money for food by working on the plantation.





The Assumption Sisters of Nairobi recognized the need for change and came to Thika to help. With support from *Missionary Children* around the world, the Sisters help feed lunch to the children who attend school. They hope by having meals for these children living on the plantations, they will at least have one healthy meal every day.

What the Sisters do for the children is more than simply physically feeding them. They also fuel their faith, nourish their hope and empower them through love.

The Thika Feeding Program is changing lives. By easing the financial pressure on families to provide lunch every day, and by encouraging them to send their children to school rather than work, Thika is enabling a better future for the children of their village.

The Institute of the Incarnate Word cares for the disabled people of Argentina (pictured right) as well as the poor and sick people of Bolivia, Ecuador, Guyana, Iraq, Palestine and others. In over 40 countries, they run educational institutions and provide homes for the poor.
